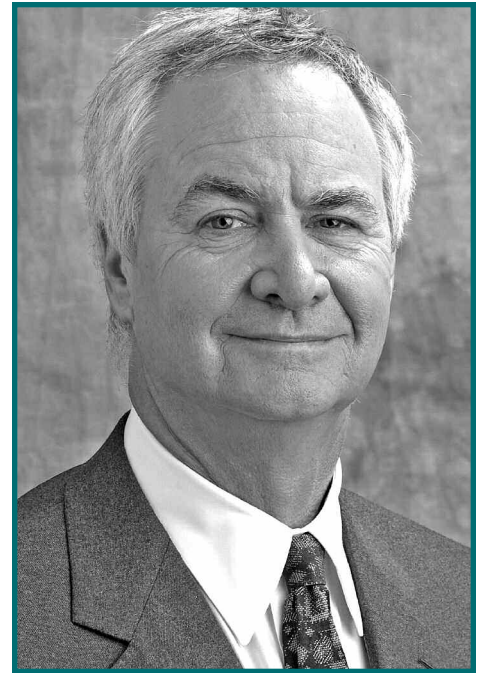

BET TZEDEK HONORS RICHARD A. KAYNE AND IRELL & MANELLA AT 18TH ANNUAL DINNER

On Thursday, January 26, 2006, at the Century Plaza Hotel, Bet Tzedek will present its highest honors to two outstanding leaders from the Los Angeles business and legal communities

Richard A. Kayne is chief executive officer and co-founder of Kayne Anderson Capital Advisors and Kayne Anderson Rudnick Investment Management. He began his career in the mid-1960s. Prior to forming Kayne Anderson, Ric was a principal of Cantor Fitzgerald & Co., Inc. He earned his undergraduate degree from Stanford and an M.B.A. from the University of California, Los Angeles in 1968.

Ric and his wife, Suzanne, are among L.A.'s leading philanthropists. He is a trustee of and the former chairman of the Investment Committee of the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA) Foundation. He sponsors the Legacy Case Competition at UCLA's Anderson School, where business students compete to create an action plan for the Anderson School. Ric is on the board of directors of Glacier Water Services, Inc. He is also a trustee and past co-chairman of the Investment Committee of the Jewish Community Foundation of Los Angeles. Ric and Suzanne are sponsors of the Kayne-Eras Center, which provides educational resources for developmentally delayed, learning disabled and emotionally disturbed children. In 2001, they were honored by the Children's Burn Foundation. For the last several years, Kayne Anderson has been a strong supporter of Bet Tzedek.

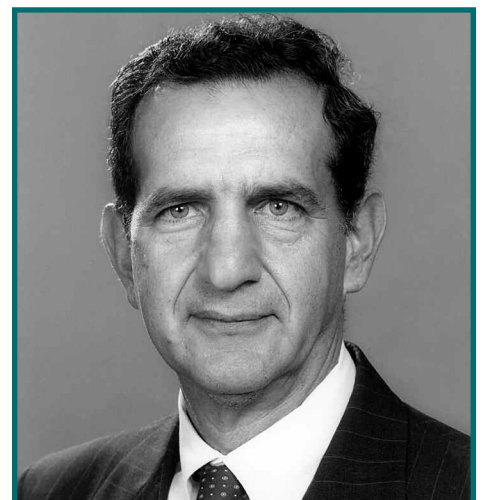

BET TZEDEK'S MISSION

Bet Tzedek—The House of Justice—provides free legal assistance to thousands of people who would otherwise be unable to afford legal counsel.

Bet Tzedek was founded in 1974 by a small group of lawyers, rabbis and community activists who sought to help elderly residents of an L.A. neighborhood who faced the loss of their homes from redevelopment. These founders found their motivation in a central tenet of Jewish law and tradition, which appears in the Bible: “*Tzedek, tzedek tirdof*—justice, justice you shall pursue.” This doctrine decrees that it is the duty of all men and women to advocate the just cause of the poor and helpless.

Although Bet Tzedek remains intent on ensuring that the legal needs of the Jewish poor are fulfilled, we recognize that it is our duty to serve all who need help. For this reason, Bet Tzedek has always provided assistance to all eligible needy residents throughout Los Angeles County, regardless of race, religion or ethnicity.

Indeed, at The House of Justice, we believe that our wonderfully diverse society is strengthened when bridges are built that bring all groups together in a common righteous cause. For the people who are Bet Tzedek—the lawyers and non-lawyers, staff members and volunteers, contributors and clients—our mission, therefore, is to pursue equal justice for all.

Bet Tzedek Stats & Facts

Bet Tzedek provides free legal services on a completely nonsectarian basis to low-income, elderly and disabled residents of Los Angeles County.

- We serve approximately 10,000 people each year, providing legal representation, advice, counseling and referral on a wide range of legal matters.
- Annual cash budget for 2005 was \$5.2 million: 57% of those revenues were raised from private sources including law firms, corporations, individuals and foundations; 19% came from government contracts; 19% from the State Bar and the Equal Access Fund; 4% from the United Way and Jewish Federation.
- An additional \$5 million in value is given to BT each year from more than 400 attorneys and paralegals who perform approximately 33,000 volunteer hours on behalf of our clients.
- Bet Tzedek devotes nearly 90% of its total budget (cash revenues and donated goods and services) to program services and less than 3% to fundraising and 8% to administrative costs.
- Bet Tzedek has a staff of 55, including 23 full-time attorneys and 9 paralegals who provide 23,500 hours of attorney time each year.
- 67% of our clients are age 60 or older; 63% of clients are female; 28% are Latino; 24% are African-American; and 7% are disabled. Each year, we represent approximately 800 elderly survivors of the Holocaust, most of them Jewish.
- Offices are located on Fairfax Avenue and on Victory Boulevard in North Hollywood. BT attorneys and paralegals also visit 30 senior centers throughout Los Angeles County on a regular basis.

OUR CLIENTS AND OUR RESULTS

A son and his gravely disabled mother—a blind double amputee with kidney failure—who survive on handouts when he stopped working to provide around-the-clock care for her.

At Bet Tzedek, the son and mother secured a tenacious advocate who spent days battling an unresponsive bureaucracy until the mother got nursing care so her son could return to work.

Frail and elderly seniors who have been billed thousands of dollars for unexplained “fees” by their nursing home operators.

BT’s Nursing Home Advocacy Project attorney obtained refunds for those nursing home residents for what turned out to be illegal fees.

A frail, 87-year-old widow who had lived in her home for 60 years, Mrs. Gilford was defrauded out of the deed to her house by the daughter of a lifelong friend and neighbor. Her despair over such callous treatment from someone she had long regarded as a surrogate daughter was nothing compared to the terror she felt when she found an eviction notice in the mail.

A friend from her church took Mrs. Gilford to Bet Tzedek, where one of our veteran attorneys came to her assistance. The attorney untangled the web of deception and dishonesty that had threatened Mrs. Gilford with the loss of all that was familiar and comforting. A court order restored title to the house to Mrs. Gilford.

A father of three works 10 hours a day, seven days a week and hasn’t received a paycheck in two months.

BT’s Employment Rights Project attorneys take his claim before the State Labor Commissioner and get the back wages owed to him.

A first-grader whose great-grandmother has provided her with stable and loving care since birth, but who may be placed in foster care when the mother she barely knows is arrested.

BT’s Kinship Care Project attorney goes to court and obtains legal custody for her loving great-grandmother just in time to avoid foster care placement.

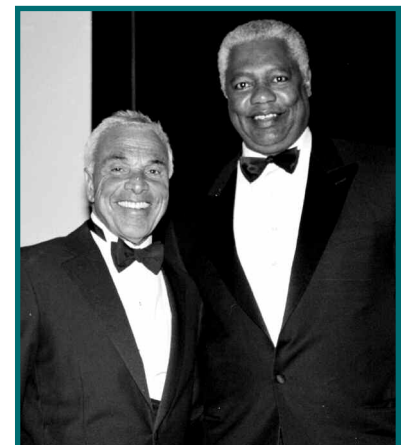
